WE ARE AN INDEPENDENT CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

Faith Baptist Christian School enjoys a friendly family atmosphere catering for 100 students. Of these, fifty nine (59) were enrolled in primary school and forty one (41) in secondary school. The student body was comprised of males (51%) and females (49%) and of those 8% were indigenous.

Our school is inclusive of people of other beliefs in that students of other faiths may attend; however, the school reserves the right to establish, maintain and promote the doctrines to which we subscribe.

Furthermore, we are inclusive of students with learning disabilities with 26% of students with disabilities enrolled and being offered individual support.

The student body consists of several cultural backgrounds including Australian, South African and Filipino families. This is reflective of the local population in the Gladstone region. Students at FBCS come from a mixture of professional and vocational families from around the Gladstone district.

DISTINCTIVE CURRICULUM OFFERINGS

Our educational program is aligned to the Australian Curriculum standards supported by a Biblical Christian worldview. Curriculum used for Year 11 and 12 is based on a variety of Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) syllabuses and study plans. The vision of the school is to see each student come to a saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ and to develop their abilities, talents and gifts with a view to service in the community. The school's educational program aims to develop students holistically with a priority given to the development of Christian character and leadership potential. Ultimately, the school aims to prepare students who are aware, informed and ready to contribute to the global economies. This is supported and achieved by student involvement in work experience opportunities.

Spiritual Values

Students are shepherded towards the spiritual rebirth and to a life-long commitment to follow Jesus Christ based upon knowledge of His character and His teachings.

Academic Values

Students are taught how to learn and are encouraged to develop a desire for knowledge, understanding and wisdom, thus facilitating life-long learning.



Social Values

Biblical precepts are used to instill respect and honour for each other, authorities, and parents.

Physical Values

Students are taught to have a Biblical regard for their personal fitness, cleanliness and purity, personal property and the property of others, and for their local and global environments.

In 2023, the school community continued to further develop the curriculum as directed by the Strategic Plan.

The curriculum strongly aligns to the Australian Curriculum while upholding an individualized approach to education. Students are engaged at their own level of ability and allowed to progress at their own rate of learning. Advancement through the curriculum is based on mastery learning.

Under the new strategic curriculum initiative, the school will continue to develop expanded learning opportunities aimed at providing all types of learners with engaging educational activities.




KEY STUDENT OUTCOMES

MANAGEMENT OF NON-ATTENDANCE

Initially, parents are to provide an attendance note in Compass by 10am, otherwise they will receive an Absence SMS. These notifications are sent at 10:15am. If parents receive an Absence SMS, they are to follow the Compass link to enter an attendance note (explained absense) by 12pm. The school will follow our Attendance Policy and Procedures if "Unexplained Absences" continue to accumulate.
